Personalized Co-constructed learning based on each learner's unique strengths, skills, interests, and needs.

- Develop learners' metacognition, self-regulation, and perseverance

Competency-based An evidence-based instruction, assessment, and feedback cycle that drives learning based on progress toward desired knowledge, skills, and dispositions.

- Harness assessment & data as learning
- Use a mastery approach to learning
- Measure mastery through performancebased assessments

Options to remediate and extend embedded in all unit plans.	We still plan to have grade levels. Classes will still happen on a semester schedule.	Have students monitor their own growth/ mastery of learning. Embed goal setting and reflection more regularly in every class.
	Personalized: Students make decisions about what, when, where, and/or how they learn and how they will demonstrate what they've learned.			
	Personalized: Students receive just-in-time, tailored instruction and/or instructional resources based on their individual needs.			
	Personalized: Learners engage in flexible learning pathways and pacing.

Competency-based: Learners progress based on demonstration of proficiency, not seat time.			
Competency-based: Assessment is a positive and engaging learning experience for students that empowers them to turn feedback into action.			
Competency-based: Learner growth is transparently measured through demonstration of learning outcomes— the knowledge, skills, and dispositions learners seek to attain.			
Equitable & Inclusive: Strategies to ensure equity and inclusivity for all learners are embedded in learning experiences and classroom culture.			
Equitable & Inclusive: Learners have a strong sense of belonging at school and feel safe to be their authentic selves.			



Learner-Centered Element	Current Practices	Known Constraints	Aspirations
Authentic: Learners engage in real-world learning experiences, creating authentic products for authentic audiences.			
Authentic: Learning can happen anywhere, anytime. Students receive credit for learning that takes place outside of the school building.			
Authentic: Learners collaboratively engage with peers to solve problems and get/give feedback. Cooperation skills are nurtured.
