Tool: Equity of Voice Audit

Did you know that 89% of the talking that happens in a classroom is done by the teacher? How do we reconcile this when we also know that those doing most of the talking are doing most of the learning? Using protocols and methods to ensure all learner voices are heard is a component of a learner-centered learning experience.



Use this tool to audit the verbal and non-verbal participation in your classroom which will help inform how you can equitably elevate the voices of all learners.

TIPS

This type of an audit can be challenging while teaching and managing a classroom full of young or even older learners. Here are a few additional options:

Record your class and watch it back to do the audit
Invite a trusted colleague to come and do the audit for you
